

Texas' Size, Diversity, and the Enormity of Needs Necessitates a Concurrent Approach


We work **statewide** to improve system responses, **regionally** to develop regional continua of care, and **locally** to implement the coordination of care for survivors.





Developing Regional Continua of Care

Regional Administrators work to develop and sustain a variety of services in their regions and support prevention, awareness, and justice activities.



CSTT Strategies for Recognizing Victims




- Raise public awareness
- Provide targeted training and outreach to recognize victims
- Implement proactive screening tool in youth serving agencies
- Support data collection and research to better recognize and understand sexual exploitation of youth



CSEY Generally Don't Make Outcries

Implementing the Commercial Sexual Exploitation Identification Tool (CSE-IT)

Complete online scoring sheet with information gathered (5-7 minutes).



A "clear concern" score means that the youth is very likely a victim and is eligible for services to address trauma, including a full needs assessment.




CSE-IT Results So Far in Texas

Texas child serving agencies* have conducted 55,000+ screenings of youth 10-24 years of age.

Most of those screened are high risk youth.

(Date Range as of 2016-October 2021)

*This total does not include screenings completed by the Texas Department of Family & Protective Services






CSE-IT Results So Far Nationally

As of October 2021, 121,170 youth screened across the United States and Canada.

- No concern: 86,924 youth
- Possible concern: 20,265 youth
- Clear concern: 13,981 youth






CSTT Strategies for Recovering CSEY



- Supporting Commercially Sexually Exploited Youth (CSEY) Advocates
- Supporting Emergency Shelters and Stabilization and Assessment Centers for child and youth victims
- Supporting drop-in centers to provide for immediate needs and engagement in services for youth who are at elevated risk to have been victimized
- Developing and supporting care coordination teams and their Advisory Councils





Long-term, flexible case management and advocacy to support and optimize other conditional case management/advocacy services.






Survivor Care Coordination

Multidisciplinary collaboration to ensure survivors don't slip through the cracks





Survivor Care Coordination



Care Coordinator: point of contact, notifies & convenes CCT and communicates plans & decisions


CSEY Advocate: engages with child immediately upon recovery, maintains supportive, trust-based relationship and contact throughout healing and aftercare

CSTT Strategies for Supporting Healing



- Equipping stakeholders to provide trauma informed responses and ongoing services
- Developing long-term residential and community services for victims, including adult victims to provide ongoing support and build resiliency
- Engaging regional administrators to work with public and private partners to identify and fill gaps in regional continuum of care




Trust Based Relational Intervention®



- TBRI is a trauma-informed intervention that equips first responders and caregivers to meet the needs of traumatized children and help them to better control their own trauma responses.
- It includes 3 core elements:
 - *Empowering Principles* to address physical (including brain) needs,
 - Connecting Principles for attachment needs, and
 - Correcting Principles to disarm fearbased behaviors.



Specialized Services to Support Healing





CSTT Strategies for Bringing Justice



- Providing training and resources to criminal justice systems to hold exploiters accountable and empower victims
- Combatting emerging methods of exploitation
- Shifting cultural norms from blaming victims to empowering them and holding exploiters accountable
- Providing long-term support and empowerment for survivors

Vision on Human Trafficking

DFPS has made the fight against human trafficking a priority – it must be eradicated.

Foster youth who age out of state care face many challenges and can be at a higher risk of human trafficking because of homelessness.



Human Trafficking

Human Trafficking and Child Exploitation (HTCE) Division

Focus

For the children and youth served by DFPS, the DFPS HTCE division strives to:

- Strengthen continued compliance with all federal and state human trafficking mandates,
- Develop best practices in the prevention of trafficking, and
- Improve DFPS capacity to identify, report, recover and support victims of trafficking in their restoration journey.

Sex Trafficking

Compelling or encouraging the child to engage in sexual conduct as defined by Section <u>43.01</u>, Penal Code, including compelling or encouraging the child in a manner that constitutes an offense of trafficking of persons under Section <u>20A.02</u>(a)(7) or (8), Penal Code, solicitation of prostitution under Section <u>43.021</u>, Penal Code, or compelling prostitution under Section <u>43.05(a)(2)</u>, Penal Code

- Texas Family Code §261.001(1)(G)

Sex/Labor Trafficking

- Knowingly causing, permitting, encouraging, engaging in, or allowing a child to be trafficked in a manner punishable as an offense under Section <u>20A.02</u>(a)(5), (6), (7), or (8), Penal Code, or the
- Failure to make a reasonable effort to prevent a child from being trafficked in a manner punishable as an offense under any of those sections

- Texas Family Code §261.001(1)(L)

Jurisdiction

DFPS

In accordance with Texas Family Code §261.301, DFPS investigates allegations of child abuse or neglect when abuse or neglect, including sex and labor trafficking, is allegedly committed by a person responsible for a child's care, custody, or welfare, such as a family member or an adult living in the home of an alleged minor victim.

Specifically for human trafficking, DFPS investigates if a person traditionally responsible for the children's care, custody, and welfare does either of the following:

- Knowingly causes, permits, encourages, engages in, or allows a child to be trafficked, or
- Fails to make a reasonable effort to prevent a child from being trafficked.


Definition: Person Responsible

Texas Family Code § 261.001(5)(A)-(D) defines a person responsible for a child's care, custody, or welfare as:

- Child's parent(s);
- Guardian appointed by the probate court;
- Managing or possessory conservator;
- Member of child's family or household;
- Person with whom child's parent(s) lives; and
- School personnel or volunteer.

Person NOT Responsible includes:

neighbors, a pimp, and an adult boyfriend or girlfriend of child, even if child has moved in with that person.



Definition

Child's Household


40 Texas Administrative Code <u>§707.451</u>(a)(8)(A)


- Child's family's household (i.e., parents' household or both parent' households if they reside separately);
- Household in which parent has arranged for or authorized placement of child (for ex- parental child safety placement or when parent sends child to live with relatives during summer break); or
- A household in which child is legally placed by parent or the court (i.e., household of a managing conservator or guardian).

Jurisdiction and Protective Parents

DFPS firmly believes that protective parents should have the right to advocate for their children who have been victimized.

DFPS' involvement is inappropriate when a child or youth has protective parents who can and will intervene for their child.

Referrals

When contacted by professionals about youth needing resources, our staff:

- Engages in mandated reporting, if the youth is under the age of 18 or is an adult under guardianship
- Helps identify what types of resources are appropriate (law enforcement, CSEY advocates, Children's Advocacy Centers, CPS, residential housing programs [youth age 18-24], food banks, shelters, drop-in centers, etc.)
- Helps referring sources determine which agencies provide those resources at a county or municipal level
- > Connects referring sources to appropriate agencies that serve the youth's community



TJJD Guide Field Resource - TJJD and Juvenile Probation Departments

- Pursuant to Senate Bill 1356 (83rd Legislative Session), TJJD began developing a training relating to human trafficking for juvenile correctional officers.
- In 2018, TJJD received a grant for implementation of the CSE-IT throughout the 165 individual juvenile probation departments, as well as within TJJD.
- At the end of 2021, 153 departments had been trained and had activated the tool, and 50,990 CSE-IT screenings had been completed.
- TJJD mission is *Transforming young lives and creating safer communities*, with the following core values:
 - Justice: We do the right thing, in all things, with all people.
 - Safety: We commit to a culture that protects youth, employees, and the public.
 - Integrity: We build trust through transparency and ethical behavior.
 - Partnership: We achieve best results through collaboration with counties, stakeholders, youth, and their families.
 - Innovation: We proactively create opportunities to improve the juvenile justice system.


