


Intake and Referral Process





Children New to Care Demographics FY 2025*


Race/Ethnicity





Substitute Care

Of the 16,251 children in care (ages 0-17) at the end of August 2025, a total of 13,381 (82.3%) reside in a family-like home setting.

9,353 or 58% Foster Care

6,758 or 41.6% Foster Family Homes

21 or 0.1% Children without Placement 1,232 or 7.6% Residential Treatment Centers

801 or 4.9% GRO Childcare Only

317 or 2.0% Emergency Shelters

224 or 1.4% Other Foster Care

6,898 or 42% Other Substitute Care Types

6,417 or 39.5% Kinship Care (unverified)

275 or 1.7% Independent Living and Other



Time in Care (1 of 2)

The average time in care for children exiting the system has remained consistent over the past three fiscal years.

FY 2021 FY 2022 FY 2023 FY 2024 FY 2025





Time in Care (2 of 2)

Statewide **exits** from care have **decreased** over the past five fiscal years, driven by a decrease after FY 2021 in removals.


Entries into Substitute Care and Exits from DFPS Responsibility

Reunification is the most common permanency goal.


Permanency Goals (2 of 2)

Most children return home or exit to relatives or kin.

- About one-third of children are reunified.
- A total of 8% of exits are youth aging out (emancipation).
- Although there are fewer exits overall, the proportion of each exit type has stayed about the same over the last five fiscal years.
- One key difference is a larger proportion of children exited to a non-relative adoption in FY 2023-25 compared to FY 2021-22.



Children in Kinship on the Last Day of the Fiscal Year



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89th Legislative Session Kinship Updates

- **HB 5394:** Prohibits Single Source Continuum Contractors and child-placing agencies (CPAs) from pre-empting promulgated kinship rules currently being developed by HHSC and disallows these agencies from adding any other requirements.
- **HB 2350:** Prevents caregivers, including kinship caregivers, from intervening in a lawsuit or filing an original lawsuit in response to a DFPS conservatorship case until they have maintained the child in their care for a minimum of 12 months, except if both parents agree to allowing the caregiver to intervene earlier.



89th Legislative Session Kinship Updates

- Kinship Day Care Funding: DFPS secured funding to expand day care eligibility for children with kinship caregivers who are 65 or older, have a documented disability, or are employed at least 20 hours per week.
- Rider 40: Requires DFPS to establish and promote a statewide campaign on kinship care funds to begin no later than December 1, 2025.
- Support Kinship Families Caring for Youth with High Acuity Needs: \$3 million for the biennium to support kinship families of children with high acuity behavioral health in CBC regions.



New Kinship Licensing Standards

DFPS and HHSC have worked together to update kinship standards since the Federal Administration for Children and Families changed their rules to allow Title-IVE agencies to have separate standards for kinship.

Implementation Status:

- Proposed draft amendments to kinship rules were posted in the Texas Register, and the public comment period ended Aug. 1, 2025.
- Proposed changes to minimum standards for child-placing agencies is anticipated to take effect November 2025.

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Supporting Kinship Families

Kinship support must begin at placement to ensure safety and stability. To ensure success, in addition to the financial and daycare support, the kinship program provides:

- Case management
- Support navigating other systems
- Referral to local resources
- Advocacy
- Regular visits
- Training
- Continual assessments
